What the Northwest reporting hub can tell flocks of newcomers

Published in *Current*, June 13, 2011

Excerpts from commentary by Colin Fogarty, regional editor of the Northwest News Network.

They used to call us "hubs." Now, local journalism centers (LJCs) and regional collaborations are springing up all over the country. These initiatives are changing public radio news as we know it.

The Northwest News Network (N3) dates back to 1991. Its current iteration came about in 2003, like the LJs, with the help of a CPB grant. Now 12 stations, large and small, in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho rely on us for much of their daily spot news and features.

Our stations have found that regional collaboration allows them to cost-effectively extend their reporting reach, to go deeper and farther.

Here are six lessons we learned from that experience that could spark some conversation with and among journalists at the new generation of hubs.

1. Grow Organically

Grow and evolve a newsroom in ways that make sense on the ground.

2. Share the Costs/Share Your Stuff

Sharing journalists and stories cuts station overhead costs.

3. Build the Virtual Newsroom

Skype, Google Docs, and PRX Networks increase efficiency and reduce expense.

4. Edit Well

No matter how talented reporters are, everyone needs an editor.

5. Over-Communicate

E-mail and update Google Docs morning, noon, and night to keep everyone in the loop.

6. Ditch the Extra Branding

N3 does not call attention to itself, but to the reporter, the region, and the story.

The Mission of N3

N3's job is to report the news that's significant to the people of the entire Pacific Northwest. Our aim is also to give voice to the people who aren't usually heard in the news media. Our reporters are determined to tell the stories of everyday people, their interests, their lives, their problems, and their successes. Historically, public radio stations serve the places where they are located. Yet, many of the issues that affect the lives of listeners are shared across the region. People in remote areas of the Northwest have stories to tell that are just as important as those in the cities where major media outlets are often focused. We measure every element of N3's strategic plan by our guiding principle: We tell stories about the issues that matter to the region, from the Pacific Coast to the Northern Rockies, and the places "in between."

What is cross-cultural, loud, exciting, colorful, and makes children and adults say "WOW!" and want to get up and dance?

It's Coeurimba, the exciting high-energy marimba band from Coeur d'Alene, who will be the featured artist at the July KPBX Kids' Concert, held at The Salvation Army Kroc Center Performing Arts Theater on Friday, July 22, at noon. Coeurimba has been performing all over the Inland Northwest and beyond for over 20 years. They have played at workshops, folk festivals, cruises, KPBX family concerts, and more – from Victoria to Eugene, from the Tri-Cities to Nelson, British Columbia. Joining Coeurimba will be three of the talented members of the Coeur d'Alene Youth Marimba Band.

Originating from Zimbabwe, the tunes that Coeurimba performs are rhythmically intense, melodically compelling, and consist of patterns and rhythms that build, grow, and swirl around the listener. These tunes come from oral tradition and themes about everyday life in Zimbabwe. The music is not written down, but passed on from teacher to student by ear. Coeurimba continues to receive instruction from Zimbabwean teachers once or twice a year.

Marimbas have an earthy and compelling sound. Constructed of a series of tubes in different lengths, with a wooden bar on the top that is struck with a mallet, each unique marimba is a different size. The smallest and highest in pitch (the soprano) is bell-like. The largest is the bass, which is so big (as large as a grand piano) that the player must stand on a bench to reach the keys, and has rich, deep bass tones. In keeping with tradition, Coeurimba trains all 11 members to play multiple parts—some of their tunes have the players running around quickly switching instruments. Inside the swirling music mallets fly, laughter is plentiful, smiles abound, and the audience is pulled into the wonderful and colorful world of traditional African music. They will be bringing their bagful of rhythm toys and encouraging audience participation.

Come to The Salvation Army Kroc Performing Arts Theater in Coeur d'Alene, July 22 at noon, and experience the fun and joy that is Coeurimba.

The First Lady of An Evening Under the Stars Katherine Gellhorn

You always knew when Katherine Gellhorn arrived at the station. Everyone snapped to attention and rushed to do her bidding, and

she almost always had on a hat, handbag, and matching shoes. She was arts royalty in our city and was treated as such, not only by those of us at Spokane Public Radio, but all the arts and non-profits lucky enough to have her attention. Katherine worked with a wide variety of arts groups and organizations including Connoisseur Concerts, American Cancer Society, the campaign to save the Davenport Hotel, KPBX, and The Opera Buffs, a group that promoted her greatest musical passion: opera.

Katherine was both persuasive and persistent in support of her many projects. One admirer said when Katherine approached, "I learned to just open my wallet and ask – how much?" Due to her intense desire to better our city, few could resist Katherine's charms.

In the early 1990s KPBX was searching for an annual event to help raise funds during our historically cash strapped summers. Katherine conceived of an evening that would celebrate the beauty of our region and showcase our local musicians, combined with dining and dancing under a full moon. She loved bringing people together.

**TECH TALK****Or the Winter that Wouldn't Leave**

Well, to follow up on my last installment, we duly submitted our grant applications to help fund the power upgrade of KSFC. A few weeks later, we were informed that no grants will be forthcoming this year and the grant program itself (the Public Telecommunications and Facilities Program) is being terminated. We will have to quickly come up with alternate ways to fund this project.

Although we are still planning the new installations at Kellogg, Twisp, Omak, and the upper Okanogan, the weather has not allowed us to make any real progress. For example, on May 2, I had to hire a snowcat to get to the Kellogg site. Some of the other sites are beginning to clear now and I understand that one of them is even drivable. We have applied to the granting agencies for time extensions, due to weather conditions.

The re-launching of the KPBX HD2 and HD3 streams has been hampered by microwave reception problems at Mica Peak. I think we have improved that situation enough to proceed. We have moved all of the encoding equipment to the mountain and I will try again to get the HD programs on the air. I am still waiting for one more piece of gear to be configured to allow audio to be transported to Mica Peak loading down the network at the studio.

I still have a large amount of old diesel fuel at the site that I'm trying to either treat or dispose of. If you have suggestions, please email me at jolson@kpbx.org.

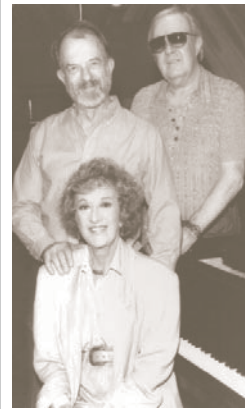
